

Islam in Southeast Asian Societies: In Search of a "More" Islamic life

This seminar focuses on Indonesia, which has the largest Muslim population in the world. People want to be more "Islamic" in their daily lives, and they ask whether various activities are acceptable from the viewpoint of Islamic jurisprudence, or how they should be handled. Questions range from inheritance and inheritance-related issues to marital life and family planning. In this seminar, by introducing the contents of individual consultations through the online service provided by "Republika", the largest Islamic daily newspaper in Indonesia, I would like to highlight the aspect of contemporary Indonesian society in which people are seeking to be "more" Islamic.

Hiroko Kinoshita is an Associate Professor at International Student Center (ISC), Kyushu University. She obtained Ph.D. from the Graduate School of Asian and Afrian Area Studies, Kyoto University in 2012. Her research interests include transnational mobility and migration and social networks in Islamic World. She is currently conducting research on LGBTQ issues in Southeast Asia and the Middle East, using quantitative text analysis method.

As part of the Study in Japan Global Network Project in Middle East and North Africa, supported by MEXT, she has been involved in project related to attracting international students from the Middle East and North Africa, as well as planning and organizing study abroad fairs in the region, such as in Iran, Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Turkey. She has also coordinated "Summer in Japan", a summer course for international students at ISC, and "ASEAN in Today's World", a shot-term outbound program for KU students co-hosted with partner universities in ASEAN countries. Currently, as a coordinator of the College of Asia Pacific (CAP), she organizes and manage the short-term outbound program co-hosted by University of Hawaii Manoa and other exchange programs between KU students and international students.
